JOB SAFETY

RETIREE

Did you ever hear about the Hockey coach who took over for his injured goalie and inspired his team to a Stanley Cup victory.

LESTER PATRICK, man and boy, spent more than 40 years in big-time hockey as a player, manager, coach and team owner. PATRICK revolutionized the game, won fame as the greatest defenseman of his time, and sparked his team to several world Championships in Stanley Cup playoffs.

But his unforgettable day came in March 1928, when the Patrick-Coached New York Rangers were meeting the powerful Montreal Maroons in the annual battle for the Stanley Cup. During the second game of the post-season classic, a flying puck bounced off a hockey stick and hit the Ranger goalie in the eye.

The team did not have a substitute goalie capable of handling the nets, so LESTER PATRICK -- the 50-year-old coach -- came off the bench, donned the heavy pads, and took over in the Ranger goal.

The coach gave his team new spirit and drive. With PATRICK playing like a youngster in the nets, the Rangers went on to win the game and the Stanley Cup.

Hockey is one of the fastest games in the world of sport. A goalie must stand up to opponents who flash across the ice at 30 miles per hour...and who, at point-blank range, blast the hard rubber puck at him.

To a goalie the heavy pads, the gauntlet gloves, and the lately developed face mask are vital tools of his trade. Any goalie would be foolish to attempt to defend his net without all his protective equipment.

Even though you don't have to stop flying pucks, you must be sure you use the right safety equipment to protect yourself on the job. Gloves, hard hats, eye protection, special clothing, and safety shoes or metatarsals -- are just as important on your job as a "goalie's" equipment is to him.

Doing your job without the recommended safety equipment or clothing can be just as foolish as a goalie doing his job in a swimming suit.

Don't play injury's "game" -- "play it smart" -- use the proper safety equipment and -- keep that equipment in tip-top shape by checking each safety feature to be sure it will protect you when you need it. Use it for maximum --
