INFLUENZA VACCINE

Last year for the first time a program of free flu shots was offered to all employees. 604 of our people availed themselves of the opportunity. It is that time of year again and on next Wednesday, October 8, the vaccine will be given again. For Office employees the time will be 11:00 a.m. to Noon in the Office Canteen. For Plant employees it will be 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the Assembly Canteen Area.

Employees who availed themselves of the vaccine last year will only receive the one shot. However, those who chose not to take it last year and wish to do so now will require two injections. The second shot, if necessary, will be given on December 10.

Nurse RYAN urges all employees to take advantage of this opportunity, but adds a word of caution. Any one who is allergic to eggs, chicken feathers or chicken should not receive this vaccine.
