


1ST. OF ITS KIND

On the surface of things the tractor shown in the picture looks no different than any one of hundreds that have come off our production lines. Not so!!! This tractor is unique -- the first one produced here with a powder metal transmission.

The powder metal gear story at Bradley is an interesting one and dates back to early 1972 when the decision was made to investigate its possibilities.

In May of '72 JOE DRESS, who had considerable experience in the Powder Metal field, was hired and put in charge of the project. Two presses, a sintering furnace and miscellaneous equipment were purchased at a cost, including tooling, well in excess of \$800,000. JOE has assembled a staff of three including CHARLEY BRINKMAN, Tool Man, JOHN RAIMONDO and WALT DUPUIS, Operators and now, after 25,000 hours of testing the project is in eration.

According to JOE the Powder Metal Process will effect substantial savings, not only in tractor parts, but in chain saw and tiller parts as well. It could also provide unlimited possibilities for new business.





OLD TIMER OF THE WEEK

This week we honor ARDELL HANNOVER of Purchasing who started his Bradley career on April 21, 1941 at 20 years of age. His first assignment was in Steel Stores for just a few weeks before moving to the Blacksmith Shop where he helped to make Ford-Ferguson mower parts and work on the plowshare line. In 1952 he went to Material Control as an office employee and in 1960 went into Purchasing being promoted to exempt status four years later. At present he is Buyer for Roto-Spaders and Tractor Attachments.
