OLD TIMER OF THE WEEK

This week's Honored Employee EDWARD "EDDIE" CIERYCA came to work at Bradley on August 29, 1941. His first job was running the drop hammer. When the Swagers came in he transferred to that job, and when they were moved into the Cutting-In-Room EDDIE went right along. He is presently a crane helper in D/81. His entire career has been in the Blacksmith area.

During World War II EDDIE spent almost three and a half years in service. While stationed at Jefferson Barracks he took a mechanical aptitude test which resulted in his being moved into the Air Corps, and into a succession of schools: Randolph Field, Texas, San Diego B24 school, Fort Worth, San Diego B32 school, Pensacola, and Willow Run, Michigan. Just when he was slated for an overseas assignment he was pulled out of the group because he had too many points. His service lasted from May '42 to November '45.

EDDIE and his wife Frances have been married for 33 years. Tragedy befell the family since EDDIE was the Old Timer in 1970, having lost his son Paul in a drowning accident. Son Edward, who worked in the Machine Shop is now the jailer at the County Jail. EDDIE and his wife also have one grandson.

## **FLU SHOTS**

We are again offering an influenza vaccine program to all employees. This program is entirely voluntary, and we are happy to make it available.

Experience has shown that the use of the influenza vaccine has enabled many people to avoid influenza, or to have a much lighter case and one of short duration. This is not a "cold shot" but does provide good immunity to influenza.

Following vaccination, protection usually develops within a week or ten days and usually continues from three to six weeks. Only a very small percentage of those who receive the vaccination experience a mild reaction. This is usually in the form of slight aching soreness of the arms, chilliness and sometimes a slight elevation of temperature.

As a word of caution, if you know that you are allergic to eggs, chicken feathers or chicken you are not advised to receive this vaccine. Your family physician is unquestionably acquainted with influenza vaccine and you may wish to consult with him before participation in the program.

This years program will be given in a series of two immunizations and will include both types A, B and Hong Kong strain, and for those receiving it for the first time, however, the booster shot (which is only one shot) is given to those who have been receiving the vaccine over the past several years.

If you desire to receive the vaccine, please come to the First Aid and sign your name on the form. This is for the purpose of purchasing the right amount of vaccine.

Anyone now on layoff but returning by November 17, may receive them. A date for the shots will be announced at a later date.
