CORPORATE CHANGES

The Roper Corporation Board of Directors met in Kankakee last week and the following changes in corporate structure were approved.

The Office of the Chairman was created by the Board of Directors of the Roper Corporation. The office will be shared by C.M. HOOVER who continues as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, and JAMIE C. GIBSON, who was elected President and Chief Operating Officer. MR. HOOVER, who had previously carried the title of President, stated that members of the Office of the Chairman will share "concurrent responsibility and authority over all company activities". As Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, MR. HOOVER remains the Corporate Head, with ultimate responsibility for the overall direction and performance of the Company. MR. GIBSON was also elected as a member of the Board of Directors.

Four other executive appointments also were announced by the Board. ROBERT E. COOK, Secretary-Treasurer, was elected Corporate Vice-President-Administration in addition to his duties as Secretary-Treasurer. J. WILLIAM BARNARD, Corporate Controller, was elected a Corporate Vice-President, LAWRENCE D. BROBST, presently Executive Vice-President, Roper Lawn Products Company, was elected Corporate Vice-President and named President, Roper Lawn Products Company. WILLIAM C. WAGGONER, was named Senior Vice-President. He will continue as Chief Financial Officer with additional responsibility in the area of Corporate planning.
