Amond the Class A alternates FRANK MCNASH had 85 for Low Gross, PETE JOHNSON had 87 while ALLIE and DUST had 70. JOHN GRIMES with 97, JOE COTE 99 and STEVE CHESLA 100 had the best gross scores among Class B alternates.

Both long drive prizes were won by CHUCK HANNERS in Class A and by GARY KINNEY and MAYNARD BLANCHETTE in Class B.

Closest to the pin prizes in Class A went to NICK GIN-ERIS and JOHN COFFMAN. WEISKE and HENRY BITTMANN were prize winners in Class B.




