NEW TELEPHONE SYSTEM

Effective Monday, March 28, a new Centrex Telephone System was installed at the plant. Much more modern and sophisticated than the old system, it should result in more improved service, but makes for many changes in the use of our phones. A few of these changes should be mentioned at this time as they pertain to all employees.

- 1. The phone number has been changed from the old 933-4441 to the new number 937-6200.
- 2. The switchboard at the plant is in operation Monday through Friday from 8 A. M. to 4:30 P. M. Incoming calls at other times will be routed through the guard house.
- 3. Employees reporting in ill between the hours of 7 A. M. and 8 A. M. may dial 937-6201 which is a direct line to the nurse. This line should be used only for the reporting of illness.

It should be mentioned again that, only in extreme emergencies, will incoming calls be transferred to employees working in the factory.




