Luray Caverns

The beautiful Caverns of Luray, known all over the world, are situated at Luray in Page County, Virginia, in the famous Shenandoah Valley on the Lee Highway in a region renowned for its historical association.

The caves were discovered in 1878, and shortly thereafter were opened to the public. The temperature of the caves is always 54 degrees in winter and summer. They cover between 27 and 28 acres of land.

The entrance to the caverns is a large, stone building. Inside the building are places where post-cards and pictures of all kinds can be bought.

Upon entering the caves the first sight you see is the Cathedral. It looks as if there were large drapes in the background with a pillow lying in front of the drapes. Next you see the organ and chimes. The organ itself is made up of stalactites. When played, the organ sounds like a xylophone; it is played with a stick of wood about a foot long. The chimes are just opposite the organ and are about six feet high. When played, they sound like real chimes.

The name of the island on which the Statue of Liberty stands is Bedloe's Island and is the property of the United States.

Next we enter the Ball Room in which twenty-two couples have been married. The beautiful, colorful stalactites and stalagmites form

## The County Tournament

Momence was the popular champion of the tournament after their brilliant defeat of St. Anne 22-12.

The scores of the tournament games were as follows:

Bradley won the high score honors of the tournament with 88 points. Reddick was a close second with 86, while the Momence Champions scored but 61 points.

The six high score men of the tournament were:

For the first time in the history of the tournament a free throw contest was conducted. Chartier won in the finals from Vial of Manteno. Chartier threw 23-22-21, or 66 free throws out of a possible 75 chances. This mark should stand as a record for years to come.

After the County Tournament the team went on to finish their season with flying colors winning five and losing one game. Bradley easily won from Manteno on their own floor 24-18. Chebanse came back for a return game and had the local's (ouch) scared to death after the tournament fame but they were easily put away 36-18. It was in

this game Joe Longtin had his field day with 9 baskets.

On Washington's birthday Bradley won from Herscher 19-22 in probably their poorest played game of the season. On the following Friday night Chartier pulled up with a bad ear infection and Reddick won the game on their own floor, 25-32.

In their greatest game of the season and in celebration of Senior night the locals completely disorganized the fighting Braidwood Preps 31-23. Again Bradley went out and got its points early and coasted through the second half, protecting their 23-7 lead. Braidwood has a team of class and power and is doped to win the Joliet District.

In this Senior night celebration Coach Young started and used an all Senior line-up, until Chartier was removed from the game late in the last quarter. The Senior team was: Forwards, Powers and Longtin; Center, Chartier; Guards, Zajc and Lambert.
